to preventive health supervision and health screening

Comprehensive Developmental Screening (CDS) AHP is working with a community practice to pilot integrating comprehensive developmental screening tools into EMR and practice workflows. The practice team continues to optimize their workflows for M-CHAT-R/F and piloting the SWYC (Survey of Well-being of Young Children) which are both approved, recommended screening tools by AAP's Bright Futures. To date, increases in pre-visit report efficiency and increased completion rates have been seen when the survey is made available two days before a visit.

Standardized tools are essential and recommended in the AAP Bright Futures guidance at key intervals: Ages 9, 18, 30 months for screening for global developmental delay and ages 18 and 24 months for autism spectrum disorder (ASD).

- SWYC: Includes brief questionnaires to assess three domains of child functioning: gross development, emotional/behavioral development, and family context.
- M-CHAT-R/F: A 2-stage parent-report screening tool to assess risk for Autism Spectrum Disorder

Start at 9
Campaign

The American Cancer Society's "Start at 9"
Campaign is underway. HPV vaccination is
cancer prevention; giving a strong
recommendation for HPV vaccine at age 9
will increase vaccine completion success and
prevent more cancers. AHP is also partnering
with Dr. Cindy Rand to support her clinical
research project focused on improving
practice workflow and HPV immunization
rates.
